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# **Executive Summary**

#### 1. Introduction

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires local communities and states to prepare a 3–5-year Consolidated Plan, Annual Action Plan, and Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER) in order to receive federal housing and community development funding. The City of Mesquite is a participating jurisdiction and receives entitlement grants from HUD for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). This document is the City of Mesquite's 2025 Annual Action Plan and states how the City plans to allocate and implement the fiscal year (FY) 2026 CDBG entitlement funds of \$1,047,108 for the program year (PY) 2025 beginning October 1, 2025, and ending September 30, 2026.

Strategy 1. Improve and preserve the city's housing stock.

**Objective DH-1.1 (availability/accessibility of decent housing):** Reduce the number of single-family homes with lead-based paint hazards through the City's rehabilitation program. **2025 outcome/goal:** 5 housing units

**Objective DH-1. 1 (affordability of decent housing):** Continue to support programs to rehabilitate and improve existing single-family homes occupied by low- and moderate-income and special needs owners. **2025 outcome/goal:** 30 housing units

Strategy 2. Support organizations that provide services for the city's special needs and low and moderate-income populations.

**Objective SL-1.1 (availability/accessibility of a suitable living environment):** Provide funding to organizations that provide supportive services for the city's special needs and low and moderate-income populations. **2024 outcome/goal:** 7,653 people

Objective SL-1.2 (availability/accessibility of a suitable living environment): Increase involvement and support of the All Neighbors Coalition Continuum of Care process and the annual point-in-time homeless count. 2025 outcome/goal: 1 point-in-time homeless count, Continuum of Care membership, Continuum of Care Board Member of Youth Committee, Coordinated Access System (CAS) Committee, Point In Time Committee, and Street Outreach Committees.

Strategy 3. Improve and maintain the city's neighborhoods.

**Objective SL-3.1 (sustainability of a suitable living environment):** Achieve and preserve neighborhood integrity through a positive Code Enforcement program by providing inspections and issuing code enforcement violations in CDBG eligible neighborhoods. **2024 outcome/goal:** 21,535 households benefited in area.

# 3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

The City of Mesquite established three strategies to address housing and community developments for program year 2024. The following summarizes how CDGB funds were used to address the city's needs.

Strategy 1. Improve and preserve the city's housing stock, including housing for special needs populations.

Single-family housing rehabilitation and maintenance support of both owner and renter occupied structures in the CDBG-eligible areas have supported this strategy.

- The City of Mesquite provided a Single-Family Housing Rehabilitation program that provided exterior and interior home repair (through the Major Renewal Program) and Emergency Repair grants to low-income, single-family households to improve, repair, or replace items that pose an imminent threat to health and/or safety.
- The Neighborhood Development program used CDBG funds to enforce minimum property standards to ensure proper maintenance of both rental and homeowner structures in CDBG-

eligible areas. The activity proactively addressed substandard living conditions, both interior and exterior, with an aggressive Rental Certificate of Occupancy program.

**Strategy 2. Support organizations that assist the city's special needs population -** The City has supported several organizations that provide public services targeted to assist persons with special needs including persons who are at-risk of homelessness, victims of domestic violence (including children), low-income adults and families and persons with disabilities. The following organizations have been able to offer assistance due to CDBG funds:

- Hope's Door provides outreach services, mental health counseling, transitional housing, and emergency shelter to women and children who are victims of domestic violence.
- Sharing Life Community Outreach serves as a food pantry hub for the community, provides rental
  assistance and non-food essentials. Other programs available include the WARM program, which
  provides temporary shelter for individuals who are unsheltered during times of extreme weather
  conditions. The organization also serves as a Financial Empowerment Center, providing financial
  coaching, GED testing, and employment services.
- The Senior Source is a non-profit agency that assist seniors and their families with a range of agerelated issues such as: finances, transportation, and companionship. The Senior Source Ombudsman program exists as an advocacy program for elderly Mesquite residents in long-term care facilities with the goal of resolving various client concerns such as long-term care issues, resident's rights, and abuse and neglect.
- The Family Place provides domestic violence intervention services to victims and their families. Services include emergency shelter, counseling, case management, and support services such as employment assistance, access to legal support, medical and dental care.
- Visiting Nurse Association provides a "Meals on Wheels" program that provides home-delivered meals five days a week to homebound or disabled seniors in Mesquite. The Visiting Nurse Association also employs an embedded Community Health Worker to provide direct support to "Meals on Wheels" clients in Mesquite. The Visiting Nurse Association is a non-profit that provides healthcare services to the elderly and disabled individuals who are also homebound.

### Strategy 3. Improve and maintain the city's neighborhoods.

Through code enforcement, the City has assisted the residents in improving and maintaining the neighborhoods in CDBG-eligible areas of Mesquite.

• Code Enforcement CDBG funds were used to fund the salaries and activities of code enforcement officers who cover 59 CDBG-eligible areas. Through inspection and enforcement of code violations, the code enforcement officers have helped prevent neighborhood decline.

## 4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

To inform residents of the public input process and opportunities for the 2025-2026 Annual Action Plan, a notice was published on the City's web site and posted in the local newspaper, and The Daily Commercial Record. Two public hearings regarding the activities and recommended budget proposed in the 2025-2026 Annual Action Plan were held on June 16, 2025, and July 21, 2025. The purpose of the hearing was to obtain comments from residents and to allow individuals or organizations requesting funding to address the City Council. In addition to the public hearings, a comment period was held June 16, 2025, through July 21, 2025, in which citizens had the opportunity to provide further comments with access to the 2025 Annual Action Plan draft available online and at the Housing and Community Services building at 1616 N. Galloway Ave., Mesquite, TX 75149.

# 5. Summary of public comments

#### 1. Introduction

In preparation of the 2025 Annual Action Plan, the CDBG Division of the Housing and Community Services Department engaged in coordination with other City departments and considered recommendations provided by the City Council. Residents were afforded the opportunity to submit comments through two public hearings and a 30-day public comment period.

The City of Mesquite continually engages and builds relationships with local service agencies, private industry, and health providers. For example, the Public Housing Agency in Mesquite, The Mesquite Housing Division, is a division of the City of Mesquite and housed in the same department as CDBG administration, allowing for constant coordination. Mesquite Housing administers the City's Housing Choice Voucher program and was consulted during the development of the Consolidated Plan and annual Action Plan. The following Table in Question 2 represents a comprehensive list of those who participated in the 2024 Annual Action Plan process. In connection, with the City's Analysis of Impediments, the city has made continued effort to focus on fair housing by collaborating with property owners as well as current public housing clients through a series of training session and education events.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Housing Forward is the lead agency designated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for the Dallas and Collin Counties Continuum of Care (CoC). The Continuum consists of several agencies including local governments, nonprofits, faith-based organizations, housing providers, and other community organizations and individuals. The Continuum meets regularly through general assembly and workgroup meetings to collaborate on homeless issues and services including the allocation of ESG funds, HOME funds, performance standards, policies and procedures, HMIS, housing opportunities, and other resources. While the City of Mesquite does not receive ESG funds, the City is involved and supports the Housing Forward Continuum of Care (CoC) and their annual point-in-time homeless count and through membership on the Homeless Collaborative Governing Board. The City also funds Sharing Life Community Outreach which provides rental assistance to families and individuals facing imminent homelessness. The City of Mesquite Southeast Alliance Community Care Team also hired a Homeless Outreach Coordinator, whose role is to provide case management services to unsheltered individuals and families. The Homeless Outreach Coordinator attends meetings and trainings provided by Housing Forward.

The City of Mesquite does not receive ESG funds. However, the City is involved and supports the Housing Forward Continuum of Care (CoC), who is the geographic area's CoC with Housing Forward as the lead agency. The CoC is continually developing and evaluating performance standards and policies for ESG allocation as well as the administration of HMIS through various task committees.

The City of Mesquite's public service grants are provided for assistance to special needs populations citywide, including persons who are at-risk of homelessness, victims of domestic violence (including children), and low-income adults and families. Similarly, housing rehabilitation services will be provided to qualified extremely low- to low-income homeowners throughout the City of Mesquite. Code Enforcement is one of 2 Low- Moderate Area (LMA) benefit activities. Code Enforcement will take place in CDBG-eligible areas to prevent deterioration. The second activity is through Boys and Girls Club of Greater Dallas, located in a CDBG-eligible area, servicing youth in the surrounding area.

Approximately 16.7% percent (\$175,000) of PY2025 entitlement funds will go towards specifically affecting the LMA CDBG eligible areas through neighborhood revitalization activities. Code Enforcement activities will take place in CDBG-eligible areas where there is a concentration of substandard housing stock, neglected improvements, and/or property nuisances. The objective of Code Enforcement is to achieve and preserve neighborhood integrity by providing inspections and issuing code enforcement violations. Code Enforcement activities are a proactive approach to arrest neighborhood decline, which requires owners to reinvest in the maintenance of their property.

Approximately 1.2% (\$13,266) of PY2025 entitlement funds will go towards specifically affecting the LMA CDBG eligible areas through the Mesquite Youth Enrichment program. The Mesquite Youth Enrichment Initiative to directly address the needs of the City's low-income youth, empowering them with the tools, mentorship, and opportunities they need to thrive now and into the future.

The City of Mesquite's Housing and Community Services Department will continue to make the issue of homelessness a priority through programs that ensure extremely low- to low-income households are able to maintain and afford homes and other services through the housing rehabilitation program, funding public service agencies, and the Housing Choice Voucher Program. The City of Mesquite is involved with and supports Housing Forward Continuum of Care (CoC), which builds relationships with many shelters, transitional housing agencies, and supportive care providers within the continuum if services are needed. The City of Mesquite will participate in the CoC's annual point-in-time count in an attempt to reach out to homeless persons within the city. The City will require that all Agencies seeking CDBG funding for services related to homeless and at-risk of homelessness must be Contributing Organizations in the Dallas County Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to ensure client access to increased or continued services. The City's Housing Division holds annual CoC membership, allowing staff to vote on countywide homeless and housing policies, and network with local service providers. Community Services staff will continue to provide CoC members with Equal Access Final Rule compliance trainings, developed in partnership with the Family Violence Law Center in Oakland, CA and sit on the Homeless Collaborative Governing Board. Final Rule Trainings assist Agencies with implementing polices that increase accessibility for homeless LGBTQ individuals and Youth, and the Governing Board will drive multi-sector solutions to end homelessness in our community. In the past program years, the Mesquite Housing Division was awarded more than 50 new vouchers including: 5 additional vouchers for the HUD-VASH program, totaling 15 overall, in partnership with the Veteran Affairs North Texas Health Care System to provide housing and support services to eligible Veterans and their families; 55 vouchers for the Mainstream Housing program which benefits households with one disabled member; and 25 vouchers for the Family Unification Program – Foster Youth to Independence, to provide homeless and at-risk of homeless Youth involved with the State foster care system with 36 months of housing assistance and support services. The City has collaborated with Transition Resource Action Center (TRAC) to offer support services to Youth tenants. The City also has partnerships with Hope's Door New Beginning Center and The Family Place; both agencies provide emergency shelter and essential services to homeless domestic violence survivors.

# Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Mesquite is involved with and supports Housing Forward Continuum of Care (CoC) who builds relationships with shelters, transitional housing agencies, and supportive care providers within the continuum if services are needed. The City of Mesquite has a one-year goal to sit on the annual Point-in-Time Count Committee, Street Outreach Committee, Coordinated Access System (CAS) Committee, Youth Committee and Youth PIT Count subcommittee, provide Equal Access/Gender Identity Final Rule trainings, and participate in the CoC's HMIS system. The City's Homeless Outreach Team will continue its partnership

with Southeast Alliance Community Care Team who responds to requests for street outreach submitted by Mesquite Code Enforcement Officer and Police Officers. Recently, CDBG established several new partnerships including Mesquite Independent School District which provides a safe and nurturing environment for at risk students through a holistic approach through an educational, emotional, and relationship-based framework. The Family Place, a non-profit that provides services to domestic violence survivors and their families. The City of Mesquite also has a partnership with the Southeast Alliance Community Care Team. The program's efforts focus on checking in on residents with a history of mental health issues to ensure they receive the treatment and services needed. The Homeless Outreach Coordinator provides homeless outreach to the participating cities and serves as a conduit for homeless clients by providing referrals to the appropriate social services. The Homeless Outreach Coordinator develops and maintains working relationships with established area homeless shelter organizations. These relationships coordinate client-level social service referrals and to streamline the needs of homeless clients.

## Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Mesquite is involved with and supports the Housing Forward Continuum of Care (CoC) who builds relationships with shelters, transitional housing agencies, and supportive care providers within the continuum if services are needed. The Housing and Community Services Department also has an established relationship with Sharing Life Community Outreach, a non-profit that provides motel room assistance, amongst other resources, to homeless persons.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Mesquite is involved with and supports the Housing Forward Continuum of Care (CoC) which builds relationships with shelters, transitional housing agencies, and supportive care providers within the continuum if services are needed. In past program years the Mesquite Housing Division was awarded more than 50 new vouchers including: 15 vouchers for the HUD-VASH program in partnership with the Veteran Affairs North Texas Health Care System to provide housing and support services to eligible Veterans and their families; 55 vouchers for the Mainstream Housing program which benefits households with one disabled member; and 25 vouchers for the Family Unification Program – Foster Youth to Independence, to provide homeless and at-risk of homeless Youth involved with the State foster care system with 36 months of housing assistance and support services. The City has collaborated with Transition Resource Action Center (TRAC) to offer support services to Youth tenants. The City also has partnerships with Hope's Door New Beginning Center and The Family Place; both agencies provide

emergency shelter and essential services to homeless domestic violence survivors.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The City's activities for non-homeless special needs populations for program year 2025 are:

- Objective DH-2. 1 (affordability of decent housing): Continue to support programs to rehabilitate and improve existing single-family homes occupied by low- and moderate income and special needs owners.
- Objective DH-1.1 (availability/accessibility of a suitable living environment): Reduce the number of single-family homes with lead-based paint hazards through the City's rehabilitation program.
- Objective SL-1.1 (availability/accessibility of a suitable living environment): Provide funding to organizations that provide supportive services for the City's special needs and low and moderate-income populations.
- Hope's Door New Beginnings Center: Domestic violence intervention and prevention
- Sharing Life Community Outreach: Emergency assistance, food pantry, school supplies, financial coaching and literacy, and computer job training
- The Senior Source: Senior/Elderly Ombudsman Services
- The Family Place: Domestic violence referrals services, counseling, and emergency shelter
- Visiting Nurse Association (VNA): Senior/Elderly Services, Meals on Wheel's program
- Boys and Girls Club of Greater Dallas: Youth Services in CDBG areas
- Hope's Clinic: Medical and preventative care for these uninsured, low-income members
- Summer Youth Internship Program: Stipend for low- and moderate income Youth receiving onthe-job training, job coaching, and resume assistance.
- Objective SL-3.1 (sustainability of a suitable living environment): Achieve and preserve neighborhood integrity through a positive Code Enforcement program by providing inspections and issuing code enforcement violations in CDBG eligible neighborhoods.

## Discussion

Several organizations and services also provide homeless preventative services in Mesquite. These include:

- City of Mesquite's Housing and Community Services Department—The Mesquite Public Housing
  Authority provides numerous vouchers targeted to preventing or ending homelessness, include
  Housing Choice Vouchers, VASH Vouchers, Mainstream Vouchers, and Foster Youth to
  Independence Vouchers.
- Parks and Recreation Department—Offer programs for low- and moderate- income persons. The
  programs are funded through the City or by private, state, and federal funding. A program
  directed at youth includes a discounted after-school care program for children whose parents

- cannot afford the cost of day care.
- Mesquite Independent School District and the City of Mesquite—Sponsor a Free Summer Breakfast and Lunch Program that is open and to all children or youth ages one to 18 years of age.
   It is provided through the Texas Department of Agriculture. Meals are served daily at selected school cafeterias. Mesquite ISD also opened the Safe Landing program, an after-school drop-in for McKinney-Vento Youth, and the Opening Doors program which provides emergency shelter to homeless Youth and young adults.
- **COMPASS**—Weekday commuter shuttle for residents who live in Mesquite but work elsewhere in the region. Residents able to utilize the service, save money on gas and parking costs.
- Southeast Alliance Community Care Team The program includes services to check in on residents with a history of behavioral health issues to ensure they receive the treatment and services needed.

# **AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)**

#### Introduction:

The City of Mesquite, in coordination with partnering agencies, provides various forms of outreach and service to the citizens in order to meet underserved needs, maintain affordable housing, reduce lead-based paint hazards, and reduce the number of poverty-level families.

## Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The City of Mesquite is strongly committed to meeting underserved needs in the community. The City has a strong and stable relationship with service providers in the area. The primary gap in the delivery of services is the lack of adequate financial resources to best serve the City's populations in need. The City will work cooperatively and support the service providers in order to maximize financial resources to reduce any gaps in the institutional structure.

The CDBG Division also draws on public and private agencies as resources or partners for housing and economic development programs and to better serve the low-income community. These partnering agencies include but are not limited to City libraries, MISD schools, local for-profit businesses, the Veteran Affairs North Texas Healthcare System, the CoC, and neighboring housing authorities.

## Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City plans to foster and maintain affordable housing through CDBG-funded programs that carry out rehabilitation-related activities, physical improvement activities, and financial assistance programs. These include:

- The CDBG Housing Rehabilitation program will conduct owner-occupied single family housing rehabilitation activities, including exterior renewal, and emergency repairs.
- CDBG Code Enforcement personnel will inspect housing that appears to have code violations, and whenever appropriate, the homeowners will be referred to the Housing Rehabilitation Program or Neighborhood Vitality's Helping Others in Mesquite Everyday (H.O.M.E.) program.
- The Housing and Community Services Department is the primary organization through which the City carries out fair housing related activities, by providing consultation and assistance to people who have fair housing questions and/or desire to file a complaint.

### Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

HUD has regulations to protect children from the hazards of lead-based paint in federally funded projects. HUD continues to provide training for compliance with these regulations. Staff from the City's Housing Division has attended trainings and is currently in compliance with these regulations for the Housing Choice Voucher program and the CDBG Housing Rehabilitation Program. Lead-based paint qualifying

housing rehabilitation projects are tested and City staff oversee mitigation efforts. In addition, the City continues to provide the required notices and information about the hazards and risks of lead-based paint to all program participants.

#### Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City of Mesquite is committed to provide the lowest income residents with quality housing and neighborhoods in addition to helping these residents move out of poverty and become self-sufficient. The City's housing and community development programs are targeted to improving the housing and neighborhood conditions of low- and moderate-income residents.

As it has done in the past, the City will continue working to attract high paying jobs and industry to the community through the Economic Development Department. The City of Mesquite will also continue to work with and through the Mesquite Chamber of Commerce and other similar bodies in the region to increase the quality and size of the labor force in Mesquite. The City continues to support the Mesquite Independent School District who provides each child with a sound educational foundation to better prepare them to assume effective positions in the workplace in the future, thus helping reduce the level of poverty in Mesquite. Through the Family Self Sufficiency Program, the Mesquite Housing Division encourages self-sufficiency of their Housing Choice Voucher participant families and assists in the expansion of family opportunities that address educational, socio-economic, recreational, and other human service needs.

#### Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City of Mesquite will implement the 2025 Annual Action Plan through the CDBG Division of the Community Services Department, which serves as the lead agency. The Housing and Community Services Department is the local government entity specifically responsible for carrying out housing and community development activities. The Community Services Department will also collaborate with other departments of the city, nonprofits, for-profits, and quasi-governmental entities including the City Council, the Mesquite Housing Division, supportive service organizations, faith-based organizations, etc., to carry out the strategies and activities of the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan and the 2025 Annual Action Plan.

As part of the annual CDBG application process, the City holds public hearings where the residents and service providers of Mesquite provide input concerning the priority needs of the community. The CDBG Division reviews the funding applications with the priority needs of the Consolidated Plan and the needs of the community in mind, and funding recommendations are then made to the City Council during public hearings for approval.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social

### service agencies

The City Council assists in the Annual Action Plan process by providing input on the needs of the community through reviewing final program year funding allocations and approving the final Annual Action Plan. As the lead agency, the Housing and Community Services Department provides consultation and assistance to people who have fair housing questions and/or desire to file a complaint.

The Housing and Community Service Department works with non-profits, for-profits, the local Continuum of Care, faith-based organizations, and public agencies to achieve the Consolidated Plan's established strategies, objectives, and outcomes. The two key roles these outside agencies serve are they receive funds through a competitive allocation process to serve low-income and special needs populations throughout the community and they provide resources for needs assessments, networking, and communication of available services to low-income or homeless clients.


