1. Mayor Alemán stated that the City partners with Sharing Life Community Outreach throughout the year and especially during the current government shutdown. Conduct a public hearing and consider an ordinance for Zoning Application No. Z0925-0419, submitted by Culinary Community Kitchen, for a change of zoning from General Retail to Planned Development - General Retail to allow all uses permitted in the General Retail District and a Mobile Food Unit Park ("MFU-Park") with modified standards, including a reduction in the 200-foot separation requirement from residential dwellings for the MFU-Park located at 4401 North Belt Line Road.

(No responses in favor or in opposition to the application have been received from property owners within the statutory notification area. The Planning and Zoning Commission recommends approval with certain stipulations.)

A public hearing was held regarding Zoning Application No. Z0925-0419.

Adam Bailey, Director of Planning and Development Services, stated that the applicant, Culinary Community Kitchen (CCK), is requesting approval of a Planned Development (PD) to allow a Mobile Food Unit Park (MFU-Park) at 4401 North Belt Line Road with a reduced separation of approximately 100 feet from nearby residential properties. While an MFU-Park is allowed in the General Retail Zoning District, it must maintain a minimum 200-foot separation from residential dwellings. A site with up to two Mobile Food Units (MFUs) serving food is permitted by right; however, three or more MFUs operating simultaneously are classified as an MFU-Park, triggering the 200-foot separation requirement.

CCK currently operates a commercial kitchen, offers cooking classes, and serves as a commissary for MFUs that prepare food for off-site sales. The proposed PD would expand these operations to allow MFUs to serve food directly on the property. There will be on-site operation of up to eight MFUs at any one time, located along the south boundary of the lot. Seating will be provided for customers on a grassy, tree-covered section adjacent to the truck yard, with access to restroom facilities. The hours of operation will be 11:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily and no late-night service will be permitted.

Applicant Mike Kelly, representing CCK, presented an overview of the proposed MFU-Park. Each food truck stall will have a power pedestal in lieu of generators. Customers will not be required to order food directly from the food trucks. There will be a QR code located at tables that can be scanned to order food from any truck and the food will be delivered directly to the customers tables.

(1) Charles Anderson, 281 Brookwood Forest, Sunnyvale, expressed support for the application.

(2) Vivian Johnson, 4538 Live Oak Drive, expressed concerns regarding speeding along Beltline Road.

Mr. Green moved to approve Zoning Application No. Z0925-0419, as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Commission, with certain stipulations, and Ordinance No. 5212, AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MESQUITE, TEXAS, AMENDING THE MESQUITE ZONING ORDINANCE BY APPROVING A CHANGE OF

ZONING FROM GENERAL RETAIL TO PLANNED DEVELOPMENT – GENERAL RETAIL ON PROPERTY LOCATED AT 4401 NORTH BELT LINE ROAD TO ALLOW ALL USES PERMITTED IN THE GENERAL RETAIL DISTRICT AND A MOBILE FOOD UNIT PARK (“MFU-PARK”) WITH MODIFIED STANDARDS INCLUDING A REDUCTION IN THE 200-FOOT SEPARATION REQUIREMENT FROM RESIDENTIAL DWELLINGS FOR THE MFU-PARK; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A PENALTY NOT TO EXCEED \$2,000.00; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. Motion was seconded by Mr. Murden and approved unanimously. (Ordinance No. 5212 recorded in Ordinance Book No. 136.)

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Conduct a public hearing and consider a resolution approving the terms and conditions of a program to promote local economic development and stimulate business and commercial activity in the City, authorizing the City Manager to finalize, execute and administer a Chapter 380 Economic Development Performance Agreement ("Agreement") for such purposes by and between the City of Mesquite, Texas, and Peter Piper, LLC, an Arizona limited liability company, ("Company") and granting to the Company certain economic development incentives, and authorizing the City Manager to take such actions and execute such documents as are necessary or advisable to consummate the transactions contemplated by the agreement, and administer the agreement on behalf of the City.

A public hearing was held to consider a resolution approving a Chapter 380 Economic Development Performance Agreement with Peter Piper, LLC.

Alberto Rivera, Manager of Economic Development, stated that the City proposes to enter into an agreement with Peter Piper, LLC, to facilitate the commercial redevelopment of an 11,000-square-foot site of an existing building located at 5550 South Buckner Boulevard, Suite 300, Mesquite, Texas 75149. The proposed agreement requires the company to complete finish outs of an 11,000-square-foot Peter Piper Pizza brand family entertainment business within the Frontera Plaza, opening by August 31, 2026, and with a 6-year lease.

Mr. Rivera stated that the agreement requires the company to make a minimum of \$2.4 million in capital improvements to the property and to hire and employ a minimum of 30 employees. The City of Mesquite will provide a one-cent State Sales and Use Tax rebate, not to exceed \$250,000.00. The agreement requires that the total Sales and Use Tax paid to the City be at least \$20,000.00 each year for six consecutive years of operations (estimated \$2 million in taxable sales per year).

Applicant Karl Crawley, representing Masterplan Consultants, stated that they anticipate beginning construction in early 2026 with completion by Summer 2026.

Vivian Johnson, 4538 Live Oak Drive, expressed support for the resolution.

Mr. Green moved to approve Resolution No. 51-2025, A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MESQUITE, TEXAS, APPROVING THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF A PROGRAM TO PROMOTE LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND STIMULATE BUSINESS AND COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY IN THE CITY; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO FINALIZE, EXECUTE, AND ADMINISTER A CHAPTER 380 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM AGREEMENT (“AGREEMENT”) FOR SUCH PURPOSES BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF

MESQUITE ("CITY") AND PETER PIPER, LLC, AN ARIZONA LIMITED LIABILITY COMPANY ("COMPANY"), AND GRANTING TO THE COMPANY CERTAIN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVES; AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO TAKE SUCH ACTIONS AND EXECUTE SUCH DOCUMENTS AS ARE NECESSARY OR ADVISABLE TO CONSUMMATE THE TRANSACTIONS CONTEMPLATED BY THE AGREEMENT, AND ADMINISTER THE AGREEMENT ON BEHALF OF THE CITY. Motion was seconded by Mr. Murden and approved unanimously. (Resolution No. 51-2025 recorded in Resolution Book No. 74.)

Mr. Green moved to adjourn the meeting. Motion was seconded by Mr. Boroughs and approved unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.
